is the student's way of honoring freedom by valuing education.

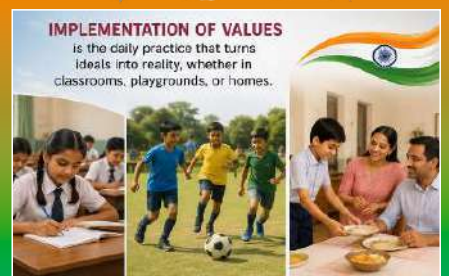

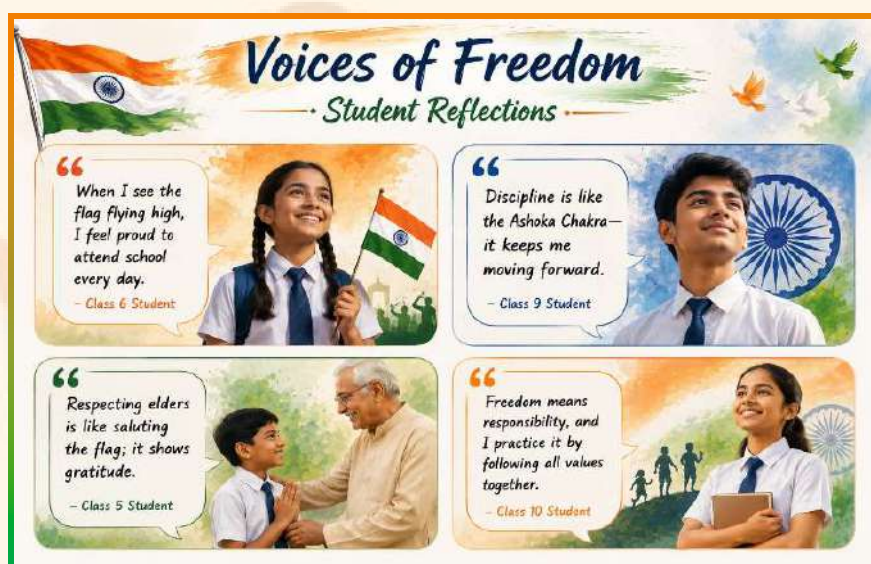
Student Reflection – Voices of Freedom

Shaurya House (Red House) Activity 1

An inspiring and enriching interactive session was organised by Red House – SHAURYA for the students of Grades IX and X as part of the Mock Parliament initiative based on the theme, “Our Soldiers, Upholding the Tricolour.”

The session focused on understanding the journey, discipline, service, and experiences associated with the Indian Armed Forces. The event began with a grand and dignified welcome for the *Chief Guest, Mr. Rajnish Kumar*, former Indian Navy service man and CEO & Founder of RAV Fire Services.



The most engaging part of the session was Mr. Rajnish Kumar’s personal narration of his life experiences. Rather than limiting his interaction to his professional achievements, he shared stories from his own student life and early years. He spoke about attending various camps, facing challenges and even receiving punishments during his training, while also explaining how his seniors guided and supported him through difficult situations.



These shared experiences helped our students understand that **DISCIPLINE IS NOT MERELY ABOUT RULES AND RESTRICTIONS BUT ALSO ABOUT LEARNING FROM MISTAKES, ACCEPTING GUIDANCE, AND CONTINUOUSLY IMPROVING ONESELF.**

He successfully connected with the students through real-life examples from his own journey. His experiences made the session relatable and motivational, particularly because the students could see how an ordinary student could gradually develop the qualities of discipline, responsibility, courage, perseverance, and leadership.

The students were captivated by the world of possibilities in editing, screen writing, and film direction.

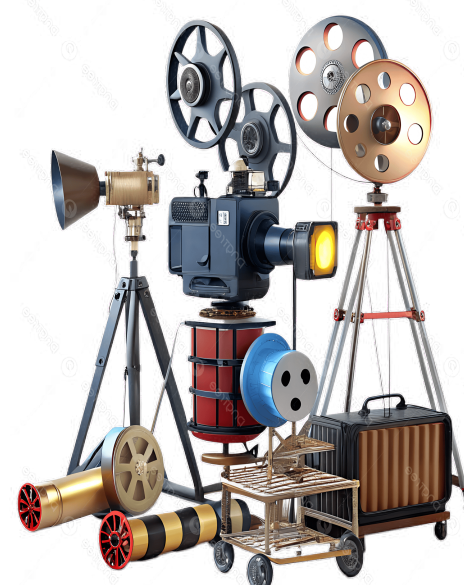
The session struck such a chord that the children later shared how the speaker had made them dream transporting them, if only for a while, into a world shaped entirely by their own imagination.

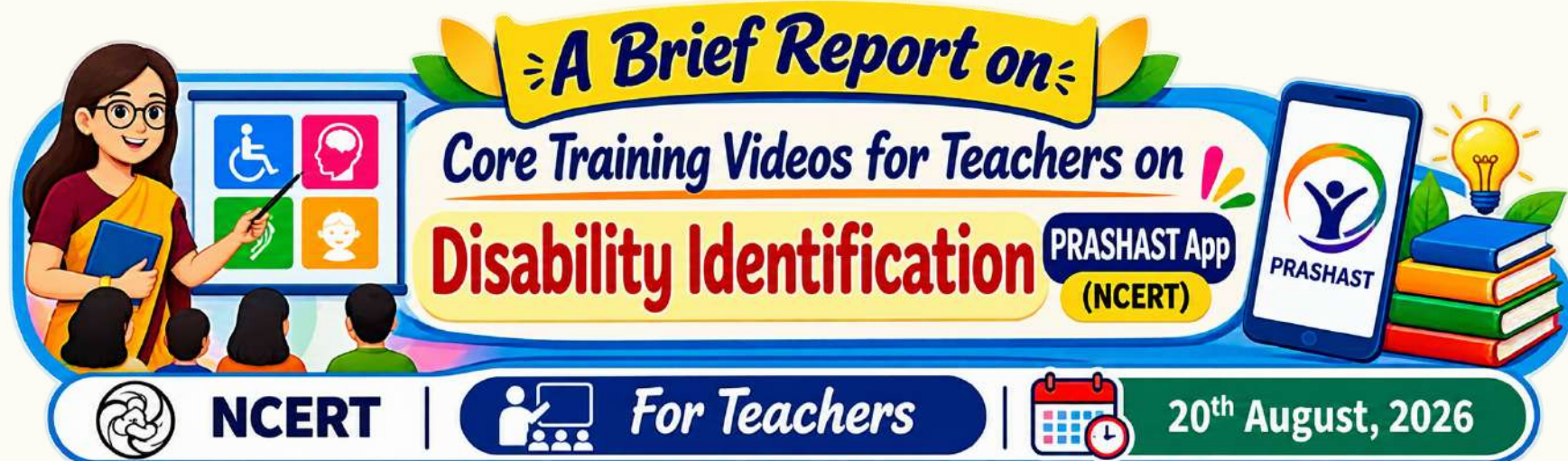
Inspired by what they heard, many felt eager to write their own stories and poems, while others found themselves drawn toward the idea of building a career in film.

I successfully completed the **10-video PRASHAST Training Programme**, which focuses on the early identification and preliminary screening of children who may require additional support.



The **training covered** various disabilities and conditions, including mobility, visual and hearing impairments, intellectual disability, specific learning disabilities, autism spectrum disorder, mental illness, and other disabilities, while also highlighting the importance of inclusive education.



One of the key learnings from the programme was that teachers are often the first to observe a child's difficulties or changes, as they interact with children regularly in the classroom. Doctors, special educators and counsellors may become involved later in the assessment and support process.



The **training emphasised** the importance of careful observation, early identification, the use of appropriate checklists, and avoiding labelling children.



The **training also reinforced** the message that disability does not define a person's potential. Many individuals with disabilities, including those affected by conditions such as polio, have set goals, overcome challenges and achieved remarkable success in their careers with the right motivation, guidance, opportunities and support.



Overall, the training has strengthened my understanding of the teacher's important role in recognising children's needs and ensuring that appropriate support and timely intervention are provided.

I would like to sincerely thank **Sr. John Mary, our beloved Principal**, for sharing this valuable PRASHAST training with us. Every teacher should be aware of PRASHAST because inclusion begins with proper knowledge, empathy, understanding and a willing teacher. This training has helped me recognise children's needs better and focus on their strengths and potential.

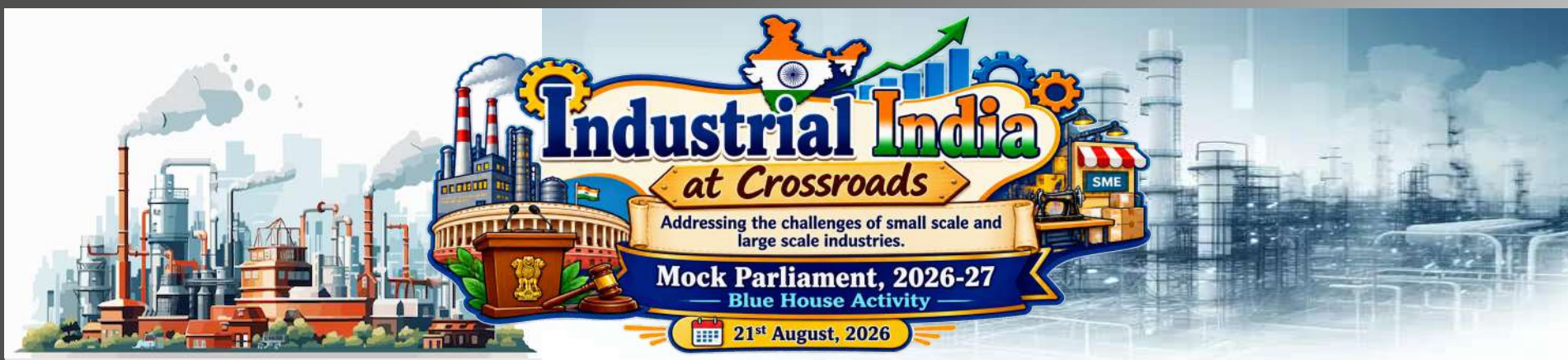

A Seminar was conducted for the students of Std.V & VI to introduce students to the importance of industries, the differences and challenges faced by small-scale and large-scale industries, the impact of technological development, and the role of young citizens in supporting India's industrial growth.

With his professional experience and knowledge of business and management, Our Chief Guest, Mr. Stennel D'Souza, Director of Aspiris Business Assurance Pvt. Ltd, provided students with an insightful introduction to the industrial sector.



Key Highlights:

- **Interactive Ice-Breaker:** The session began with an engaging thought exercise asking students where their everyday items like books, bags, and pencils come from, illustrating how everything around us connects to industry.
- **Small-Scale vs. Large-Scale Industries:** The speaker explained the core concepts and real-world examples of both small-scale industries (e.g. bakeries, garment units) and large-scale industries (e.g. automobiles, steel plants, oil refineries).
- **Industry Challenges & Solutions:** Students gained insight into challenges such as limited capital for small businesses alongside environmental, energy, and supply-chain pressures facing large-scale plants.
- **Future Tech & Green Industries:** The presentation introduced concepts of Industry 4.0 including AI, robotics, and smart factories—as well as the vital importance of green manufacturing and sustainability.
- **National Initiatives & Career Paths:** The speaker highlighted national growth initiatives like Make in India / Atmanirbhar Bharat and introduced various industrial career paths ranging from R&D engineering to entrepreneurship.
- **Interactive Quiz & Student Activity:** Following the session, students participated in an interactive True/False quiz as well as an "Activity Innovation Challenge" designed for Std. 5 and 6 to pitch creative solutions to real-world problems.

DEBATE FORUM:

A Forum of Parliamentary Debate, Critical Thinking and Democratic Dialogue

The debate session of the Mock Parliament took place at **Vidya Vikasini School**, giving the students an enjoyable chance to learn about how parliamentary democracy works and to take part in substantial discussions on important national issues.

The session was organised into four Houses which made up the Ruling Party, each of these Houses putting forward a major national issue accompanied by thorough research, logical arguments, and well-informed opinions. The Opposition then examined the issues presented and asked questions about the views expressed by each of the Houses. This method helped students to build up their critical thinking, self-confidence, ability to communicate, and a more thorough understanding of democratic dialogue.

THE RULING PARTY

The party in power was made up of four Houses, each one covering an important national issue. In order to present their topic, each House carried out thorough research and put forward relevant arguments and well-considered views.



Theme: Indian Soldiers: Upholding the Tricolour Through Strength, Sacrifice and Sovereignty

The Red House showed how invaluable the contribution of the Indian soldiers was in protecting the sovereignty and integrity of the nation and in ensuring that the Tricolour remained flying high.

The talk stressed the importance of courage, strength, discipline, sacrifice, and patriotism. It also highlighted the great responsibility carried by the armed forces in protecting the country and its people.



Theme: Industrial India at a Crossroads: Addressing the Challenges of Small-Scale and Large-Scale Industries

The Blue House dealt with the problems experienced by India's industrial sector, with a specific emphasis on the relationship between small-scale and large-scale industry.

The conversation touched on a number of important points including employment, financing, technological innovation, infrastructure, competition, and sustainable development.

The House stressed the need for balanced industrial growth, pointing out that economic development should create opportunities while at the same time providing sufficient support to small-scale industries so that they can compete, grow and remain sustainable.



Theme: Ensuring Food Security in India: From Farm to Nation, Nourishing Every Citizen

The Yellow House looked at India's food security system by following the path of food from farms through the nation and finally to the plates of the citizens.

The talk included the subjects of food production, climate-related problems, storage, transportation, distribution, food waste, food safety, and access to nutritious food.

The House stressed the need to make sure that each citizen has access to food which is adequate, safe, nutritious, and affordable.



Theme: Protection of Wildlife: A Voice for the Voiceless

The Green House concentrated on the important matter of protecting and conserving wildlife.

The presentation looked at a number of major problems including habitat destruction, human-wildlife conflict, illegal hunting and trafficking, pollution, and biodiversity loss.

The House stressed that it is essential to protect wildlife in order to keep the ecological balance and to preserve biodiversity for future generations; it also underlined the importance of responsible human behaviour, conservation measures, and joint action in protecting the natural world.



As a whole, the Mock Parliament Debate Session provided students with an effective opportunity to learn about parliamentary procedures, to express their opinions with confidence, and to take part in a constructive democratic discussion.

It promoted research, critical thinking, teamwork and a sense of responsible citizenship, thus making it a valuable and unforgettable experience for all the participants.

Adv. Neeraj Kumar Shreeram Pandey, who is a Counsel at both the Supreme Court of India and the High Court of Bombay, was our school's Chief Guest at the Mock Parliament Session 1 in 2026–2027.

In his perceptive and motivating speech he stressed that the young people are the future of our country and he pointed out the importance of democracy, leadership, responsibility and active citizenship.

The students were encouraged by him to think beyond their own interests and to understand the part they play in shaping the future of society and the nation. The valuable advice and experience he had to offer made a lasting impression on everyone there.



The 2026–2027 Mock Parliament session ended on an inspiring and memorable note and left the students with a greater understanding of democracy and the responsibilities of citizens.
